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## A note on the Committee's membership during the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress

During the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress, the Senate dealt with a number of historic organizational problems, which impacted the committee structures along with the full Senate.

The election of 2000 produced an equally divided Senate, with 50 Democrats and 50 Republicans; only one previous election, in 1880, had resulted in a tie between the two major parties, and precedents from that time were no longer considered applicable.<sup>1</sup> Furthermore, the narrow victory of the Republican presidential ticket meant that incoming Vice President Richard B. Cheney, serving in his capacity as President of the Senate, would give the Republicans a tie-breaking vote and thus a functioning majority.

The time lag between the January 3, 2001 convening of the new Senate and the January 20 inauguration of the new President, however, gave outgoing Vice President Albert Gore, Jr. a 17-day period in which he served as head of a functioning Democratic majority.

Dealing with this unusual situation, the Senate named Democratic chairmen of the legislative committees to serve from January 3 to January 20, and Republican chairmen to serve beginning at 12:00 noon on January 20.<sup>2</sup> It was further agreed that each committee would "be composed equally of members of both parties" for the duration of the 107<sup>th</sup> Congress, unless a change occurred in the party ratio of the Senate as a whole.<sup>3</sup>

That change occurred with the May 24, 2001 announcement by Sen. James M. Jeffords of Vermont that he would leave the Republican party, register as an independent, and caucus with his Democratic colleagues when the Senate returned June 5 from its Memorial Day recess. Thus, on June 6, the Senate met with a 50-49-1 Democratic majority control, marking the first time either house of Congress had changed control in mid-session.<sup>4</sup>

The following pages detail the membership of the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, and its five Subcommittees, during this historic period.

During the period of January 3-20, 2001 in which Vice President Gore oversaw a 50-50 Senate, all legislative committees continued as they had been constituted at the end of the 106<sup>th</sup> Congress in December 2000 (minus those members who were no longer in office<sup>5</sup>). Thus, Senator Paul S. Sarbanes (D-MD) would briefly serve as Chairman of the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs with a Republican numerical majority.<sup>6</sup>

When Democrats regained a majority on June 6, 2001, committees reverted back to the December 2000 lineups until the Senate could agree upon revised assignments for members.<sup>7</sup>

# COMMITTEE JURISDICTION

## EXTRACTS FROM THE STANDING RULES OF THE SENATE RULE XXV: STANDING COMMITTEES

1. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of each Congress, and shall continue and have power to act until their successors are appointed, with leave to report by bill or otherwise on matters within their respective jurisdictions:

(d)(1) Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, to which committee shall be referred all proposed legislation, messages, petitions, memorials and other matters relating to the following subjects:

1. Banks, banking, and financial institutions;
2. Control of prices of commodities, rents and services;
3. Deposit insurance;
4. Economic stabilization and defense production;
5. Export and foreign trade promotion;
6. Export controls;
7. Federal monetary policy, including Federal Reserve System;
8. Financial aid to commerce and industry;
9. Issuance and redemption of notes;
10. Money and credit, including currency and coinage;
11. Nursing home construction;
12. Public and private housing (including veteran's housing);
13. Renegotiation of Government contracts;
14. Urban development and mass transit.

(2) Such committee shall also study and review, on a comprehensive basis, matters relating to international economic policy as it affects United States monetary affairs, credit, and financial institutions, economic growth, urban affairs, and credit, and report thereon from time to time.

(j)(10) International Monetary Fund and other international organizations established primarily for international monetary purposes (except that, at the request of the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, any proposed legislation relating to such subjects reported by the Committee on Foreign Relations shall be referred to the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs).
