**EXTRACTS FROM THE STANDING RULES OF THE SENATE RULE XXV
STANDING COMMITTEES**

1. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of each Congress, and shall continue and have the power to act until their successors are appointed, with leave to report by bill or otherwise on matters within their respective jurisdictions:

* * * * * * *

(a)(1) Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs, to which committee shall be referred all proposed legislation, messages, petitions, memorials, and other matters relating to the following subjects:

1. Banks, banking, and financial institutions.
2. Control of prices of commodities, rents and services.
3. Deposit insurance.
4. Economic stabilization and defense production.
5. Export and foreign trade promotion.
6. Export controls.
7. Federal monetary policy, including Federal Reserve System.
8. Financial aid to commerce and industry.
9. Issuance and redemption of notes.
10. Money and credit, including currency and coinage.
11. Nursing home construction.
12. Public and private housing (including veterans' housing).
13. Renegotiation of Government contracts.
14. Urban development and mass transit.

(2) Such committee shall also study and review, on a comprehensive basis, matters relating to international economic policy as it affects United States monetary affairs, credit, and financial institutions; economic growth, urban affairs, and credit, and report thereon from time to time.

Specifies that these medals are national medals for the purposes of section 5111 of title 31, U.S.C.

PUBLIC LAW 98—172

H.J. Res. 93

To provide for the awarding of a special gold medal to Danny Thomas in recognition of his humanitarian efforts and outstanding work as an American.

Nov. 29, 1983.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Authorizes the President of the United States to present on behalf of Congress a gold medal to Danny Thomas in recognition of his humanitarian efforts and his outstanding work as an American.

Authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to cause such medal to be struck with suitable emblems, devices and inscriptions.

Authorizes appropriations.

Authorizes the Secretary to allow bronze duplicates of such medal to be coined and sold at a price sufficient to cover the cost of the coinage of the gold medal and the duplicates.

Specifies that these medals are national medals for the purposes of section 5111 of title 31, U.S.C.

PUBLIC LAW 98—181

H.R. 3959

To make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1984, and for other purposes.

Nov. 30, 1983.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

COMMUNITY AND NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT AND CONSERVATION: Community Development Block Grants will be reauthorized for three years at \$3.468 billion per year. Of this total, \$68.2 million will be used for the Secretary's discretionary fund for each of the three years.

The objective of the CDBG program is strengthened by requiring that during a period of up to three years, not less than 51% of the funds expended must be used by a grantee to benefit low and moderate income persons.

Cities or urban counties losing their entitlement status because of updated census information are grandfathered for two fiscal years. In the instance that a newly designated entitlement city wishes to retain its status as part of an urban county program, it may do so for a period of up to three fiscal years. A county may qualify as an urban county between decennial census' if it meets the criteria specified by the Act and has verified that it has a combined population of not less than 200,000.

Urban Development Action Grants are reauthorized for three fiscal years at a level of \$440 million each year.

HUD is required to use unemployment data in determining UDAG eligibility for small cities. Currently eligible small cities will retain their eligibility until the criteria are revised to include unemployment statistics.

The Section 312 rehabilitation loan program is extended for one year. New loans are permitted from repayments to the revolving fund.

Urban homesteading is reauthorized at \$12 million for FY84, and at such amounts as are appropriated for 1985. An equitable procedure for selecting the recipients of the properties is established. Several demonstration programs, including one using multifamily rental properties, are adopted.

HOUSING ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS: Budget authority is provided for housing assistance programs totaling \$9.9 billion for FY84 and "such sums as may be appropriated" for FY85.

The Section 8 new construction and substantial rehabilitation programs have been repealed, except in conjunction with the Section 202 elderly housing program.

PUBLIC LAWS

PUBLIC LAW 98—181—Continued

Tenants of public housing and housing assisted under Section 8 would continue to pay 30% of their adjusted income for rent by 1986. Deductions from family income will be: \$430 for each child, \$400 for any elderly family member, the amount of medical expenses in excess of 3% annual income of an elderly family, and a deduction for child care.

A voucher demonstration program is authorized in connection with the Rental Rehabilitation Development Program to assist families below 50% of median income. Public housing authorities will receive five-year contracts from HUD to make assistance payments primarily for families residing in units assisted under the Rental Rehabilitation and Development Program. The monthly assistance payment for any family represents the amount that the payment standard for the area exceeds 30% of the family's monthly income. The monthly payment cannot exceed the amount that the rent exceeds 10% of the family's income.

The Section 202 Elderly Housing Program is authorized at a level of \$666 million for FY84. An annual interest rate of 9.25% on 202 loans has been statutorily set for one year. Prepayment or transfer of a 202 mortgage will only be allowed if the project is operated under the original contract until the maturity date.

Competitive bidding would be allowed on 202 project construction only if the rents required to operate the unit exceed 110% of the fair market rent applicable to such projects, if the project exceeds \$2 million or if the project is not sponsored by a labor organization.

Lease and Grievance Procedures are established to implement an administrative procedure to advise tenants of the specific grounds of any action taken against them by a public housing agency, provide an opportunity for a hearing, and require a written decision on the proposed action.

An Emergency Shelter Program is authorized at \$60 million for FY84 to provide shelter and essential services for individuals who are subject to life-threatening situations because of their lack of housing. Grants may be used to rehabilitate existing structures, pay utilities and furnish the shelters and provide health and safety measures.

A Public Housing Child Care Demonstration program is established to utilize public housing facilities for the provision of day care for lower income residents.

RENTAL HOUSING REHABILITATION AND PRODUCTION PROGRAM: This new program is established as a lower cost alternative to the Section 8 programs for rehabilitation and construction of rental housing. Total funding for this program may not exceed \$615 million for FY84 and FY85. Of this amount, \$150 million will be available for rental rehabilitation in each fiscal year. During FY84 up to \$200 million will be available for development grants. In FY85, \$115 million will be provided for development.

This program provides grants to States and localities to support the rehabilitation of privately owned rental properties for lower income families, or for new construction or substantial rehabilitation under very restricted circumstances.

Assistance for rehabilitation grants can be used only for residential rental properties located in moderate income neighborhoods where the area income is less than 80% of median. Grant assistance cannot exceed 50% of the total cost of rehabilitation, except under limited circumstances, and must be used only to make essential improvements. A maximum of \$5,000 grant funds may be provided for each unit.

Development grants can only be made in areas experiencing a severe shortage of decent rental housing, as determined by the Secretary of HUD. Grant funds can only be used to develop rental properties, and assistance can not exceed 50% of the development cost, including acquisition. For 20 years following construction, 20% of the units must be available for persons of families with incomes below 80% of the median.

PROGRAM AMENDMENTS AND EXTENSIONS: Federal Housing Administration Mortgage Insurance Programs. FHA insurance programs are reauthorized for fiscal years 1984 and 1985 at an aggregate commitment level of \$50.9 billion per year. Losses to the fund are covered by "such sums as may be necessary".

The requirement that the FHA interest rate be set by the Secretary of HUD has been eliminated. Interest rate on FHA insured loans will be agreed upon by the borrower and the financial institution.

Properties insured under FHA may comply with one of the nationally recognized model building codes or a State or local building code based on one of the nationally recognized model building codes or their equivalent. Energy performance requirements for new construction must be at least as effective as the requirements which were in effect on Sept. 30, 1982.

Loan limits for manufactured homes and lots insured under Title I have been increased. Manufactured homes which are not insured by FHA may be refinanced through FHA if they meet the standards established in the National Manufactured Housing Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974.

Lending for condominium and cooperative housing is facilitated by allowing insurance on cooperative shares where the basic loan was not FHA insured. Loan limits for condominium units will be consistent with those provided in Section 203(b)(2).

Single family mortgage insurance is facilitated on Indian trust land, Hawaiian homelands and Pacific Trust territories where title cannot be conveyed.

The maximum amount a mortgage secured by a one- to four-family dwelling can be increased by the amount of the mortgage insurance premium paid at the time the mortgage is insured.

The maximum loan to value ratio for homes up to \$50,000 has been changed to 97% of the appraised value.

A demonstration mortgage reinsurance program has been authorized to test the feasibility of entering into reinsurance contracts with private mortgage insurers in order to reduce government risk and administrative costs and to speed mortgage processing.

Demonstration programs for alternative mortgages including ARMs, SAMs, PLAMs are authorized.

PUBLIC LAWS

PUBLIC LAW 98—181—Continued

Flood and Property Insurance Programs. The Flood Insurance Program has been extended for two fiscal years and mapping studies have been authorized at a level of \$49,752,000 for FY84 and "such sums as may be necessary" for the following year.

The Director of FEMA must submit a plan to Congress for bringing all the communities with flood risk zones in the emergency phase of the program into full program status by Sept. 30, 1987. The study must be prepared by Sept. 30, 1984.

The premium rates charged for flood insurance cannot be increased during FY84. By June 30, 1984, the Federal Insurance Administrator must submit a report to Congress on the premium rate structure for the program and an explanation of any premium increases anticipated before Oct. 1, 1985.

The Riot Reinsurance Program is repealed. The Crime Insurance Program is extended until the close of FY84.

Regulatory and Other Programs. The Real Estate Settlement Procedures Act has been clarified by permitting "controlled business arrangements" if disclosure is made. A strong anti-tying provision prohibits any requirement that a client use a particular settlement service provider.

The National Institute of Building Sciences is authorized to receive no more than \$250,000 for FY84, in addition to the amounts already authorized to be appropriated. The amount appropriated must be matched by donations from non-governmental contributors to the Institute.

The Solar Energy and Energy Conservation Bank has been reauthorized at \$35 million for FY84.

The Weatherization Program has been authorized for not less than \$190 million for FY84.

The Housing Counseling Program has been authorized at \$3.5 million for FY84.

The research authorization for HUD is \$19 million for FY84. \$2 million of this total will be used to identify current problems of public housing management and potential solutions to the problems.

Studies and reports are called for.

Secondary Mortgage Market Programs. The Government National Mortgage Association is authorized to enter into commitments to issue guarantees under the mortgage-backed securities program for an aggregate amount of \$68.25 billion for FY84 and FY85.

Rural Housing. FmHA programs are authorized for FY84 and FY85 at levels approved in appropriations.

Targeting of benefits is tightened to reach very low income families.

Tenant rent contribution and determination of income for Section 515 is conformed to requirements for Section 8.

Rural Housing Preservation Grant program at \$100 million is established to rehabilitate the stock of rental and single family homes in rural areas.

Housing affordability is emphasized by authorization of more flexible building codes, promotion of rehabilitation and use of manufactured housing.

Availability of credit has been enhanced by authorizing FmHA to recommend mortgages for insurance under HUD's FHA program.

EXPORT-IMPORT BANK: Exim Bank Act Amendments. Extends the authority of Exim for three years through Sept. 30, 1986.

Mandates Exim to be fully competitive in all its programs; Exim's primary purpose is to expand exports through competitive financing. The cost of money shall be a factor in Exim's operation.

Provides for a 12-member advisory committee to advise Exim on programs. Members are to be broadly representative of production, commerce, finance, agriculture, labor, services and State government, at least 3 of whom must be members of the small business community.

Restructures the terms of the Presidentially appointed Exim directors by providing for staggered terms consisting of four years except for two directors first appointed on or after Jan. 21, 1985, whose terms shall be for two years. Not less than one member shall be selected from the small business community.

Requires the President of the United States to transmit to the Congress a report no later than April 15 of each year on the adequacy of Exim's resources. The President can request Congress to eliminate excessive Exim loan authority for that fiscal year.

Specifies that Exim shall provide financing for the export of services, independently, or in conjunction with the export of manufactured equipment, hardware or other capital goods. Also adds to Export Trading Company Act items qualifying as security for exporters seeking Exim loan guarantees.

Directs Exim to work to ensure that U.S. insurance companies are afforded an equal and non-discriminatory opportunity to bid for insurance in Exim transactions. Directs Exim to report to the House and Senate Banking Committees not later than May 15, 1984 on this issue.

Provides greater attention to the needs of small businesses by reserving certain percentages of aggregate small business loans, guarantees and insurance authority for small business purposes in an amount not less than 6% for FY84, 8% for FY85, and 10% for FY86 and thereafter; also urges the Foreign Credit Insurance Association to provide 100% coverage for any loss of exports under \$100,000.

Authorizes Exim programs for Brazil and Mexico through March 31, 1985. Provides that Exim not extend credit to countries with balance of payment problems or assist in management of its international debt without authorization by law.

Makes technical changes.

Specifies that Exim will notify Congress if its capital stock falls below 50% of the level at the end of FY83.

PUBLIC LAW 98—181—Continued

- Provides medium-term financing up to 85% of the cost of the exports and establishes programs to advise small businesses.
- Requires Exim to report on its actions taken to support U.S. industries, to create high skilled jobs and to enhance small business growth.
- Matching Credits.** Requires that the inquiry in section 1912 of the Exim Act to be completed within 60 days of receipt of information. Section 1912 allows Exim financing to match foreign financing by providing financing to competing U.S. sellers.
- Provides appropriation authorization needed for section 1911 of the Exim Act. Section 1911 requires International Trade Commission to issue a report on Exim's impact on U.S. industries and employment.
- Makes technical changes.
- Tied Aid Credit Export Subsidies.** States purpose to expand U.S. exports, stimulate development of importing nations, neutralize predatory financing and limit use of export credit subsidies.
- Mandates President to negotiate toward clarifying use of tied aid credit.
- Establishes tied aid credit program for U.S. exports. Programs to be carried out with Agency for International Development. Authorizes blending of Exim and private financial institutions financing for export of U.S. goods and services, if proof of concessional foreign financing is being provided to foreign competitor.
- Establishes tied aid program for U.S. exports within AID. Authorizes AID to establish a fund to implement program. Authorizes blending of Exim AID grants and private institution concessional financing for export of U.S. goods and services if proof of foreign financing is being provided to a foreign competitor. Stipulates that AID funds for program to be consistent with criteria of Economic Support Funds and used for exports contributing to development objectives of importing country.
- Explains implementation of Sec. 644. Requires final approval for financing by unanimous consent of National Advisory Council.
- Provides definitions of tied aid credit, government-mixed credits, public-private cofinancing, blending of financings, parallel financing, and Bank.
- Amends the Tariff Act of 1930 to provide an accelerated means of dealing with subsidized export financing through the countervailing duty process.
- Miscellaneous Provisions.** Makes technical changes in HMDA and other statutes regarding SMSA definitions.
- Allows FDIC and FHLBB members to serve until successor is appointed.
- Extends the Defense Production Act until March 30, 1984.
- INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND:** Instructs the U.S. Executive Director of the Fund to promote exchange rate stability and to avoid the manipulation of exchange rates.
- Provides increase in the U.S. IMF quota of \$5.8 billion. Requires Secretary of Treasury to consult with Congress 30 days before and at other intervals in consideration of any future quota increase. Provides increase in General Arrangements to Borrow of \$2.6 billion. Requires the Secretary to certify that resources are needed to forestall or cope with impairment of international monetary system and that IMF has fully explored other funding before activating GAB. Also instructs U.S. Executive Director to the IMF to work for collection of information on the extension of credit by banks and dissemination of this information to the public.
- Requires prior consultation by Treasury Secretary with Congress 90 days before next vote on next allocation of Special Drawing Rights.
- Requires U.S. Executive Director to actively oppose any IMF credit drawing by any country practicing apartheid or communist dictatorship, unless the Treasury Secretary notifies Congress at least 21 days before vote on drawing, certifies and documents upon request that such drawing corrects balance of payments problems, reduces capital and labor rigidities, and is in best interests of majority in that country. Also, if requested, the Treasury Secretary shall appear before the House and Senate Banking Committees at least 21 days before the vote to so certify and document that the aforementioned conditions have been met.
- Instructs the U.S. Executive Director to work for the elimination of all predatory agricultural export subsidies.
- Requires the U.S. Executive Director to work for changes in Fund policy which would convert short-term bank debt made at high interest into long-term debt at lower interest rates. Except under certain circumstances, the Executive Director will oppose any program for any country where its annual debt services is greater than 85% of its export earnings.
- Instructs the U.S. Executive Director to oppose the use of IMF resources to repay loans imprudently made by banks.
- Directs the U.S. Executive Director, as a general policy, to avoid government subsidization of the production and export of international commodities without regard to the market for such commodities.
- Instructs U.S. Executive Director to work to bring the interest rates on IMF quota subscriptions and drawings into line with market rates.
- Directs the Treasury Secretary to notify Congress at least 60 days prior to any IMF borrowing of U.S. dollars.
- Instructs the U.S. Executive Director to work for IMF policies which reduce restrictions on international trade, promote improved economic relations and eliminate unfair trade practices. U.S. Executive Director to work for IMF agreements with countries seeking assistance that would end predatory export subsidies, unreasonable import restrictions, and other unfair practices.

PUBLIC LAW 98—181—Continued

Directs the National Advisory Council on International Monetary and Financial Policies to include in Annual Report to Congress: (1) list of World Bank reports on projects enhancing a country's ability to export a commodity in surplus which will cause injury to U.S. producers, (2) review of success in reducing or eliminating import restrictions, (3) study of impact on U.S. steel and copper industries of steel and copper subsidies by nations borrowing from the Fund, (4) review of progress in eliminating predatory agricultural export subsidies, and (5) documentation and progress made in carrying out this section.

Directs the Treasury Secretary to make the following reports to Congress within one year on: (1) U.S. membership in the Bank for International Settlements; (2) proposals to improve the floating exchange rate system; (3) recommendations on what the IMF can do to avoid the manipulation of exchange rates; (4) ability of the IMF to promote real economic growth in countries undergoing Fund stabilization programs; (5) feasibility of Fund issuing securities in private capital markets; (6) feasibility of selling Fund's gold reserves; (7) feasibility of establishing temporary supplemental financing facilities; (8) feasibility of establishing a gold lending facility; (9) recommendations on improving the role of the Fund in the international monetary system; (10) effects on market prices of gold and on U.S. credit markets in implementing (6), (7) and (8); (11) actions taken to carry out the basic human needs provisions; (12) progress on equalizing IMF interest rates with market rates; (13) impact of quota extension on world oil prices; (14) assessment of a systematic restructuring or stretch-out of developing countries debt; (15) the role that global recovery will play in solving the debt crisis; (16) adequacy of IMF resources; (17) role of IMF in providing credit to least developed countries; (18) progress being made by finance ministers and the IMF's managing director on improving the international monetary system; and (19) reviewing progress on establishing collection procedures within IMF on international lending information.

INTERNATIONAL LENDING SUPERVISION: Declares the policy of Congress is to assure that the international economic system should not be threatened by imprudent lending or inadequate supervision.

Defines the terms "appropriate Federal banking agency", and "banking institution" for purposes of this title.

Provides that the appropriate Federal banking agencies require banking institutions to establish special reserves for international loans whenever (1) there is a protracted failure of foreign borrowers to meet terms of IMF lending agreements on restructuring of loans or (2) no definite prospects exist for the orderly restoration of debt services. Requires reserves to be charged against income and not part of capital. Requires agencies to analyze reschedulings to ensure adequate capital and reserves.

Prohibits banking institutions from charging any fee for loan restructuring exceeding administrative costs, unless the fee is amortized over the life of the loan. Requires the banking agencies to regulate fee accounting.

Directs the appropriate Federal banking agencies to require banking institutions to disclose their foreign country debt exposure at least four times a year. Requires agencies to require information to be publicly disclosed.

Directs the appropriate Federal banking agencies to require banks to maintain adequate capital levels. Failure to maintain such levels may be deemed by the appropriate agency to constitute an unsafe and unsound practice within the meaning of section 8 of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act.

Requires banking institutions to prepare an economic feasibility evaluation for any foreign loan over \$20 million in mining or metal-making operations to assure the creditworthiness of the borrower and to evaluate any foreign subsidies and their impact on world markets.

Authorizes the appropriate Federal agencies to interpret and define terms used in this title and to prescribe rules and regulations as may be necessary. Provides civil penalties up to \$1,000 per day for violations of title.

Clarifies GAO authority to audit the international regulatory, examination, and supervisory actions of the appropriate Federal banking agencies. It also incorporates the safeguards which are now provided for in existing GAO banking agency audit authority.

Gives FDIC equal representation with the Fed and OCC in the Committee of the Group of Ten Countries on Banking Regulations (Basle Committee).

Requires the Treasury Secretary or the appropriate Federal banking agency, to report to Congress, not later than six months after enactment, regarding changes to improve the international lending supervision of banking institutions, strengthening capital bases of banks in international lending and on the uniform implementation of this title.

IMF APPROPRIATION: Provides appropriation for U.S. IMF quota increase of the dollar equivalent of 5.3 billion SDRs. Provides appropriation for increase in General Arrangements to Borrow of the dollar equivalent of an additional 2.25 billion SDRs, provided that official U.S. government debt reschedulings of debtor countries be submitted to Congressional Appropriations Committees.

PUBLIC LAW 98—207

H.R. 4476

To extend the authorities under the Export Administration Act of 1979 until Feb. 29, 1984, and for other purposes.

Dec. 5, 1983.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Extends the expiration date of the Export Administration Act of 1979 from Oct. 14, 1983 to February 29, 1984.

PUBLIC LAW 98—222

H.R. 4956

To extend the authorities under the Export Administration Act of 1979 until March 30, 1984.

Feb. 29, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Extends the expiration date of the Export Administration Act of 1979 from Feb. 29, 1984 to Mar. 30, 1984.

PUBLIC LAW 98—265

S. 1852

To extend the expiration date of the Defense Production Act of 1950, and for other purposes.

Apr. 17, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Amends the Defense Production Act of 1950 to extend its expiration date to Sept. 30, 1986.

Sets forth the criteria under which the President may authorize the guarantee of loans to defense contractors, including: (1) the essentiality of the material or service to the national defense; (2) industry's need for such a guarantee before providing the necessary capability; (3) the cost-effectiveness of the guarantee, considering the alternatives; and (4) that defense demand is equal to or greater than the output of domestic industrial capability which is determined to be available for national defense.

Sets forth similar criteria for loans to private business enterprises and the purchase of raw materials under such Act. (The criteria set forth are the existing Department of Defense criteria for evaluating project proposals under title III of the Defense Production Act.)

Eliminates the legislative veto provisions from such Act requiring instead that Congress approve proposed loan guarantees, loans, or purchases through the authorization and budget process with established thresholds for appropriations.

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal years 1985 and 1986.

Directs the President to make annual reports to the appropriate congressional committees on the impact of offsets on the defense preparedness, industrial competitiveness, employment and trade of the United States.

PUBLIC LAW 98—278

S. 2597

To authorize the awarding of special congressional gold medals to the daughter of Harry S Truman, to Lady Bird Johnson, and to Elie Wiesel.

May 8, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Authorizes the President, on behalf of Congress, to present gold medals to: (1) Margaret Truman Daniel, daughter of Harry S Truman, in recognition of the lifetime of public service he gave to the United States; (2) Lady Bird Johnson, in recognition of her humanitarian efforts and contributions to the improvement and beautification of America; and (3) Elie Wiesel, in recognition of his humanitarian efforts and contributions to world literature and human rights.

Authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to cause such medals to be struck with suitable emblems, devices and inscriptions.

Authorizes appropriations.

Authorizes the Secretary to allow bronze duplicates to be coined and sold with the appropriation made to carry out the coinage of such gold medal and bronze duplicates to be reimbursed out of the proceeds of the sale of the duplicates.

Specifies that these medals are national medals for the purposes of section 5111, 31 U.S.C.

PUBLIC LAW 98—285

H.R. 3240

To authorize the President of the United States to present on behalf of Congress a specially struck medal to the widow of Roy Wilkins.

May 17, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Authorizes the President to present on behalf of Congress a specially struck gold medal to Aminda Badeau Wilkins, the widow of Roy Wilkins, in recognition of his incomparable contribution to the struggle for civil rights and equality for all Americans.

Authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to cause such medals to be struck with suitable emblems, devices and inscriptions.

Authorizes appropriations.

Authorizes the Secretary to allow bronze duplicates to be coined and sold with the appropriations made to carry out the coinage of such gold medal and bronze duplicates to be reimbursed out of the proceeds of the sale of the duplicates.

Specifies that these medals are national medals for the purposes of Sec. 5111, 31 U.S.C.

PUBLIC LAW 98—376

H.R. 559

To provide for tax reform and for other purposes.

July 18, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

TITLE VIII, Sections 2801-2814: Amends the Federal Credit Union Act to require an application for Federal share insurance to include an agreement by the applicant to pay to and maintain a deposit with the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund. Requires each insured credit union to include in its certified statement to the National Credit Union Administration Board the amount of its deposit, or adjustment thereof, to the Fund for that year.

Requires each insured credit union to pay to and maintain with the Fund a deposit in an amount equaling 1 percent of the credit union's insured shares. Requires the Board, each year, to return to credit unions on a pro rata basis all funds not required to maintain the equity in the Fund at normal operating levels.

Repeals the provision of such Act which authorizes the Board to assess a special premium charge.

Provides for penalties against a credit union for: (1) failure to include the amount of deposit in the certified statement; (2) failure to pay the deposit; and (3) payment of dividends when in default on payment of the deposit. Requires that the information on the 1 percent deposit be included in a credit union's records.

Permits the Board to prescribe the dates of the insurance year.

Increases the normal operating level of the Fund from 1 percent of all insured shares to 1.3 percent. The Board may set a lower normal operating level.

Prohibits premiums from being assessed on amounts in any account in excess of the insured account limit.

Requires the Board to report annually to specified congressional committees with respect to the operating level of the Fund. Requires the deposit collected by the Board to be deposited in the Fund.

Requires a credit union to maintain its deposit in the Fund during the one-year period following termination of insurance. Permits, upon mutual consent of the Board and the credit union, account insurance to cease immediately upon the effective date of comparable insurance from another source.

Exempts the Central Liquidity Facility, its franchise, activities, capital reserves, surplus, and income from all Federal, State, and local taxation, other than real property taxes. Makes such exemption retroactive to Oct. 1, 1979.

Eliminates fees for the processing of up to three allotment checks per pay day for Federal civilian employees.

To amend the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to increase the sanctions against trading in securities while in possession of material nonpublic information.

Aug. 10, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Amends the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to permit the Securities and Exchange Commission, whenever it appears that any person has traded in securities while in possession of material nonpublic information, to seek an order in a district court action requiring the violator, or anyone who aided and abetted the violation, to pay a civil penalty of up to three times the profit gained or loss avoided as a result of the unlawful transaction.

Requires the Commission, if such person fails to pay such penalty, to refer the matter to the Attorney General, who shall recover such penalty by action in the appropriate U.S. district court.

States that no person shall be subject to such a sanction solely because that person aided and abetted in such a transaction in a manner other than by communicating material nonpublic information. Declares that no person shall be liable under such Act solely by reason of employing another person who is liable.

Prohibits any such action from being brought after five years after the date of the purchase or sale.

Increases from \$10,000 to \$100,000 the maximum criminal fine that may be imposed on persons, other than exchanges, who wilfully violate the Securities Exchange Act of 1934.

Authorizes the Commission to begin administrative proceedings to effect compliance with requirements for the disclosure of information relating to a tender offer.

Provides that whenever communicating, or purchasing or selling a security while in possession of, material nonpublic information would violate or result in liability under such Act, such conduct in connection with a derivative security shall also violate and result in comparable liability.

Subjects persons who have engaged in certain misconduct under the commodities laws to statutory disqualification.

Permits an administrative proceeding against broker dealers, or associated persons, based on misconduct in the commodities markets.

PUBLIC LAWS

PUBLIC LAW 98—396

H.R. 6040

To make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1984, and for other purposes.

Aug. 22, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Title III, Sec. 305: Expresses the sense of Congress that the President, in cooperation with the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System should: (1) exercise appropriate authority to assure that an adequate flow of credit be available to American farmers at reasonable rates; (2) assure that American farmers be treated no less favorably than foreign borrowers with comparable levels of risk; and (3) take noninflationary actions necessary to reduce interest rates.

PUBLIC LAW 98—440

S. 2040

To amend the Securities Act of 1933 and the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 with respect to the treatment of mortgage-backed securities, to increase the authority of the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation, and for other purposes.

Oct. 3, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

TITLE I: Defines "mortgage-related security" for purposes of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934.

Exempts from certain requirements and restrictions of such Act a bona fide agreement for delayed delivery (forward trading) of a mortgage-related payment security against full payment upon delivery within 180 days (or any shorter time prescribed by the Federal Reserve Board). Declares, with respect to margin requirements, that, subject to Federal Reserve Board rules and regulations, no member of a national securities exchange, dealer, or broker shall be deemed to have extended, maintained, or otherwise arranged credit for the purchase of a security by reason of such an agreement. Declares, with respect to restrictions on borrowing and lending by members, dealers, or brokers, that, subject to Federal Reserve Board rules and regulations, no person shall be deemed to have borrowed within the ordinary course of business by reason of such an agreement.

Amends the Home Owners' Loan Act of 1933 and the Federal Credit Union Act to allow federally-chartered financial institutions, including credit unions, to invest in mortgage-related securities subject only to limitations that the appropriate regulating board might impose.

Preempts State blue sky and legal investment laws and regulations so that investment grade mortgage-related securities may be purchased by State-chartered and regulated financial institutions, insurance companies, pension funds, trustees, or other regulated entities. Permits a State to reassert limitations in investments in mortgage securities within seven years of enactment of these provisions if it finds such regulation necessary.

TITLE II: Amends the Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA) Charter Act and the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (FHLMC) Act to require the limitation on the maximum principal obligation of a conventional mortgage, in which FNMA or FHLMC may purchase a participating interest, to be calculated with respect to the total principal obligation of the mortgage.

Authorizes FHLMC to purchase manufactured home loans whether secured by personal, real, or mixed property.

Authorizes such corporations: (1) until Oct. 1, 1987, to purchase mortgages secured by a subordinate lien against a one- to four-family dwelling; and (2) until Oct 1, 1985, to purchase mortgages on properties comprising five or more family dwelling units. Specifies limitations on the maximum principal obligation of the mortgages.

Permits the FHLMC to purchase mortgages insured by State agencies.

Removes existing loan-to-value limits on multifamily mortgage purchases.

Raises the limit on FNMA and FHLMC multifamily conventional mortgage purchases.

Expands the FNMA Board of Directors from 15 to 18 members.

Requires an annual Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) report regarding FNMA's activities.

Establishes a 45-day (with a 15-day extension) HUD approval period for FNMA requests.

Provides that the FHLMC may not guarantee mortgage-related payment securities backed by mortgages not purchased by the FHLMC.

Sets forth standards for FHLMC for issuing preferred stock.

Requires the Secretary of HUD to do a study on mortgage prepayment penalties and the impact on the secondary market.

Terminates the Secretary's general authority to approve issuance of all FNMA obligations on Sept. 30, 1985.

Restricts the Secretary's approval of FNMA obligations to issuances of stock and of obligations convertible into stock.

PUBLIC LAWS

PUBLIC LAW 98—479

S. 2819

To make essential technical corrections to the Housing and Urban-Rural Recovery Act of 1983.

Oct. 17, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Clarifies the conditions under which a city or urban county having few areas with a majority of low- and moderate-income residents may have areawide community development activities qualify as principally benefitting low- and moderate-income families.

Amends the assisted housing program in order to correct inadvertent errors in the Housing and Urban-Rural Recovery Act of 1983 and to assure that policies agreed to in that Act are carried out, including: (1) adding to the deductions from income permitted for families living in assisted housing, the cost of attendant care and auxiliary expenses for handicapped persons to be gainfully employed; (2) permitting Section 8 vouchers to be given to families whose income is between 50 and 80 percent of area median if they are displaced by the Section 17 rental rehabilitation program; and (3) clarifying that in the Section 202 elderly housing program, the HUD Secretary may not impose different requirements depending upon the method of contractor selection.

Amends section 17 of the United States Housing Act of 1937 which creates two new rental housing rehabilitation production programs.

Permits cities containing at least 450,000 residents and having a rental vacancy rate of not more than 10 percent to apply for a rental development grant.

Clarifies that funds for the rental rehabilitation grant program will be allocated by formula to cities over 50,000 in population, urban counties and states for use in non-rural areas and in units of general local government that do not qualify for assistance from FmHA and do not receive a formula allocation of rental rehabilitation funds.

Amends miscellaneous provisions of housing law by: (1) permitting FHA mortgage insurance for units in a rental project converted to condominiums as long as prior to Apr. 20, 1984, an application for FHA insurance or VA guarantee was made; (2) permitting the National Corporation for Housing Partnerships, in order to generate income to support housing for low- and moderate-income families, to expand its activities to those involving products and services for use in the construction, sale or financing of housing and the design and development of commercial, industrial, or retail facilities that are not directly related to housing; and (3) requiring the Solar Energy and Energy Conservation Bank to issue regulations establishing the explicit criteria and their relative weights for the allocation of Bank assistance.

Makes several technical corrections necessary to clarify the intent of certain provisions adopted in the rural housing amendments contained in the Housing and Urban-Rural Recovery Act of 1983.

In addition to numerous corrections of spelling, grammatical and section designation errors in the housing and community laws, Title II makes the following miscellaneous changes to banking law: (1) permanently exempts advances on open-end lines of credit secured by real estate from Truth-in-Lending rescission rights; (2) restores specific authority for federal credit unions to make unsecured 15-year home improvement loans, inadvertently deleted by Public Law 97-320; and (3) allows a thrift institution to invest for liquidity purposes in mutual funds whose portfolios consist solely of highly rated corporate debt and commercial paper or other statutorily eligible liquidity investments.

PUBLIC LAW 98—566

H.R. 1870

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to coin and sell a national medal in honor of the members and former members of the Armed Forces of the United States who served in the Vietnam conflict.

Oct. 30, 1984.—Enacted.

DIGEST:

Authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to design, coin and sell a national medal in honor of the members and former members of the Armed Forces of the United States who served in the Vietnam conflict.

Authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to offer such medals for sale in a manner designed to elicit as much public response as possible, to be sold at a price sufficient to cover the cost of such medals, including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery, and marketing and overhead expenses.

Directs the Secretary of the Treasury to encourage and consider submission of designs for the medal from Vietnam veterans and to solicit the views of bona fide organizations which are comprised of Vietnam veterans and which represent the views of Vietnam veterans.

Specifies that these medals are national medals for the purposes of section 5111 of title 31, U.S.C.
