Dear Comptroller Dodaro:

On August 3, 2021, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued an eviction moratorium titled "Temporary Halt in Residential Evictions in Communities with Substantial or High Levels of Community Transmission of COVID-19 to Prevent the Further Spread of COVID-19."¹ I write to seek your determination of whether the eviction moratorium constitutes a rule for purposes of the Congressional Review Act (CRA).

As you are aware, the CRA relies on the definition of "rule" found in 5 U.S.C. § 551(4):

'[R]ule' means the whole or a part of an agency statement of general or particular applicability and future effect designed to implement, interpret, or prescribe law or policy or describing the organization, procedure, or practice requirements of an agency and includes the approval or prescription for the future of rates, wages, corporate or financial structures or reorganizations thereof, prices, facilities, appliances, services or allowances therefor or of valuations, costs, or accounting, or practices bearing on any of the foregoing.

Based upon this broad definition, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) has rightly pointed out that "agency pronouncements may be rules within the definition of 5 U.S.C. § 551, and the CRA, even if they are not subject to notice and comment rulemaking requirements under section 553."² Though the CDC did not pursue notice and comment rulemaking, the eviction moratorium appears to be generally applicable, prospective in nature, and designed to interpret law. For these reasons, I respectfully request that you evaluate whether the eviction moratorium is a "rule" under the CRA.
